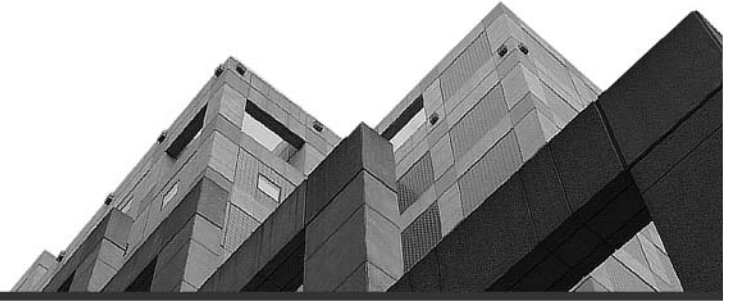

Ms. Peggy Edwards, an Ottawa-based health promotion consultant and co-chair of the National Advocacy Committee of the Grandmothers to Grandmothers Campaign (an organization that works with the Stephen Lewis Foundation to support African grandmothers and AIDS orphans) has been awarded a \$50,000 Alan Thomas Fellowship to research and develop capacity in civil society for advocacy by older women.

***The Carold Institute** for the Advancement of Citizenship in Social Change was established in 1989 with an endowment from Ms. Clare Clark, a long time participant in, and advocate for voluntary organizations in Canada.

The Alan Thomas Fellowship was launched in 2007. The Fellowship, valued at \$50,000 for one year, is awarded to a leader in the NGO/non-profit sector who would not normally have access to a sabbatical leave. The award is intended to free the recipient to make a significant contribution to the sector, through research and possible publication/dissemination.
